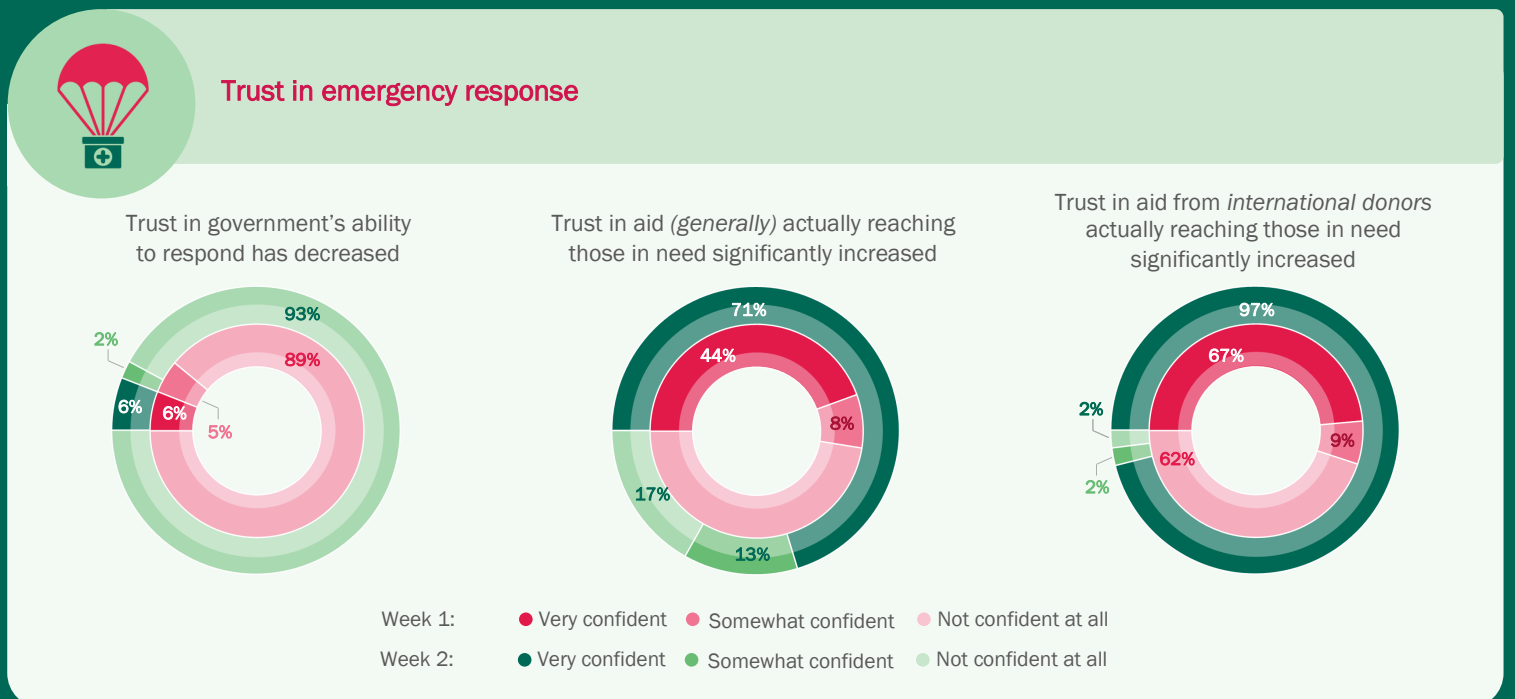
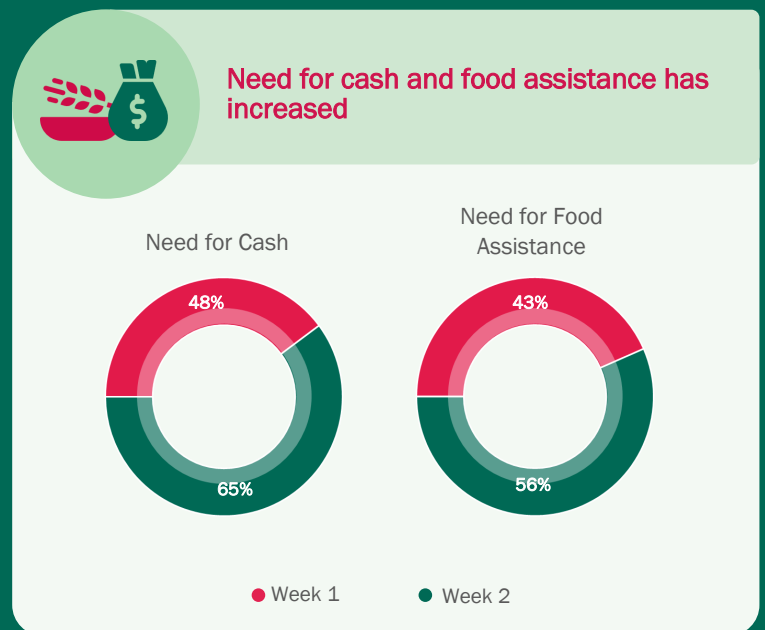
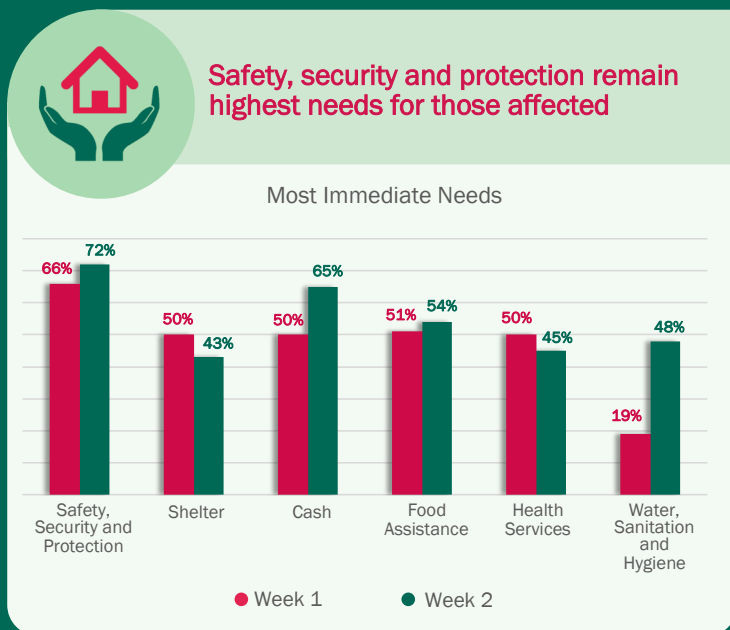


In response to the devastating explosion in Beirut on August 4, 2020 that has killed at least 200 and resulted in an estimated 300,000 displaced people, International Advisory, Products and Systems (i-APS) conducted a rapid assessment survey between August 8-9 and August 11-14 in Beirut of 201 individuals personally impacted by the event to understand their urgent needs and attitudes and beliefs about the response. The first page of this analysis presents a comparison of results from Week 1 and Week 2, during which time the international community has responded and the Lebanon government has resigned. Page two presents combined results of Week 1 and 2.



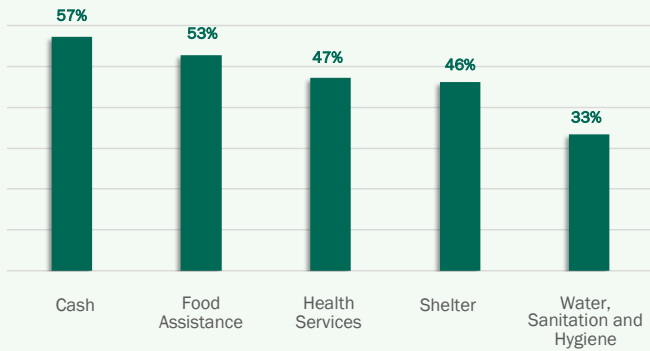

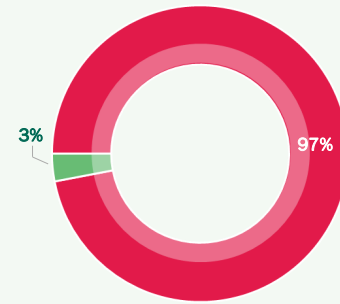
## Essential services are urgently needed

Respondents' concerns about the impact of the explosion on their household?

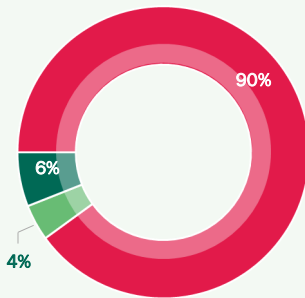


● Extremely concerned ● Very concerned

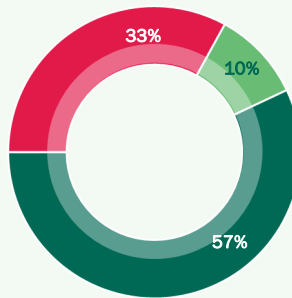


## Trust in emergency response

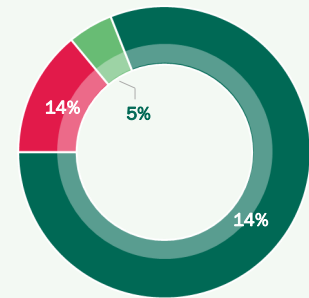
Trust in government's ability to respond is low
